CTA Office Building Open After Pandemic Closure

The new CTA Board has chosen to reopen the CTA office building to members again. Masks are no longer required.

Bargaining / Ratification Update

Regarding Contract and Salary Ratification: "While I am President we will never have a salary ratification during the summer again. I believe it is important for members of our bargaining unit to be able to talk to their colleagues while school is in session to understand what is proposed and weigh how they would like to vote. I also believe it is important that as many people as possible have the ability to vote and many people travel throughout the summer." -Clinton McCracken, CTA President

During the month of July CTA pushed for a renewed MOU for Health and Safety to include 5 days of COVID leave. We originally proposed for this to go through the entire year but agreed to a District counter for it to expire Dec. 31 in order to avoid a prolonged fight and be able to offer this leave immediately. We will revisit this in November. We are also in the process of restructuring the Bargaining Team for the 22-23 school year, including training, workshops, and surveys for bargaining unit subgroups.

"Don't Say Gay" (HB 1557) and "Stop WOKE" (HB 7) Implementation

Many members have asked for guidance regarding HB 1557 - the so-called "Parental Rights" bill or more commonly called "Don't Say Gay". Written guidance from OCPS, the Florida Education Association (FEA), and

the Human Rights Campaign are all available on our website <u>HERE</u>. Students also need to be taught our nation's full history. By learning the good and the bad, students can gain the knowledge they need to help create a better future. <u>This guide</u> created by FEA in partnership with AFT and NEA makes clear what your rights are and provides answers to frequently asked questions about teaching history in light of recent legislative attempts to censor the full truth of our nation's past.

Know Your Contract

CRMs are NOT required. The Lesson Plan agreement states that the use of CRMs is not required. Targeted, STO and Corrective Program schools cannot be required to use the CRMs either. From the Lesson Plan Agreement, "The OCSB acknowledges and agrees

that teachers are not required to use Curriculum Resources Materials ("CRMs") or any Lesson Plan Template." Keep in mind administrators have a right to question, consult, and direct when necessary. More info <u>HERE</u>.

Article XIV Duty Day, B.3.b: "No teacher shall be assigned responsibility for students for more than three continuous hours." Class changes are not a break. It is important to discuss your concern within 20 days.



OCCTA AR Leadership Incentive Checklist

To receive the **local dues** reimbursement each year the Association Representative must complete following:

____ARs will receive a refund of their local dues if they complete the following AR tasks and provide appropriate evidence by the May AR Meeting.

____ Submit the official AR Election Form listing ARs, dated and signed by witnesses by October 1st.

____ Hold all school/site committee elections (Faculty Advisory Committee, SAC teacher representative/s election, Budget Advisory Committee, and Placement Review Committee. Send in the list of names for each committee or representative by October 1st.

___ Enroll 3 new CTA members and submit the copies of the membership applications with the AR listed as the recruiter.

Submit a photo of the CTA Bulletin Board.

____ Map the school to identify a CTA leadership team. Submit outline of leadership team by hallways, by grade level or by subject area.

____ Attend 7 AR Council meetings (verified by sign-in-sheets/attendance records).

___ Attend 1 AR training – July, October or after January (sign-in-sheets).

____Attend 1 School Board meeting and submit photo evidence.

____ Hold 3 CTA leadership team meetings at the school or site (sign-in-sheets).

____ Hold 10-minute meeting after each AR council meeting (sign-in-sheets).

___Attend 1 CTA-sponsored event other than the AR meetings, such as a summit, film screening, parade, conference, or a social event (sign-in sheets or photo).

In-Person Early Voting

More and more voters are choosing to vote during early voting weeks. Voting early allows to you vote at a time that is convenient for you before election day. Early voting is currently open in every Florida county and will remain open until at least Saturday, Aug. 20.

If you live in Bradford, Broward, Charlotte, Duval, Hillsborough, Jefferson, Leon, Miami-Dade, Orange, Osceola, Palm Beach, Pinellas, Sarasota, or Taylor Counties, you can vote early through Sunday, August 21.

Vote-By-Mail

If you have already voted by mail, thank you for performing one of the most important acts we can engage in as citizens! Be sure to follow up and check the status of your ballot to make sure it has been received and your signature is valid. To check the status of your ballot, visit

https://bit.ly/VBM-status

If you have received a vote-by-mail ballot but have misplaced it or your dog ate it or have not yet mailed it in for any other reason, you can still vote by showing up at an early voting location or at your polling place on election day.

If you have your vote-by-mail ballot completed and are ready to return it, you can do so by taking it to an early voting location. Because ballots must be received by 7 p.m. on election night, August 23, your ballot might arrive too late if you mail it in now.

To be sure your vote is counted, you can either vote in person or drop off your completed vote-by-mail ballot at an early voting site, your supervisor of elections office or on election day.

In Person Voting, August 23

While many people take advantage of the opportunity to vote by mail or vote early, we know there are also a lot of people who like to vote on election day. Polls are open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. local time. As long as you are in line by 7 p.m. you will be able to vote! At your designated polling location, you will be asked to provide a valid photo ID with signature. Any one of the following photo IDs will be accepted:

- Florida driver's license or ID card
- United States passport
- Debit or credit card
- Military identification
- Student identification
- Retirement center identification
- Neighborhood association identification
- Public assistance identification
- Veteran health identification card issued by the Department of Veterans Affairs
- License to carry a concealed weapon or firearm issued pursuant to s. 790.06
- Government employee identification card

Choose one method for payment of dues:

Payroll Deduction: I authorize and request Orange County School Board to deduct Orange County Classroom Teachers Association dues and assessments from my bi-weekly pay, and to transmit the deducted amounts to the Association office. I understand the School Board will discontinue dues deduction upon 30 days' written notification to both the Association and Board. I understand that dues, assessments, contributions or gifts to the OCCTA are not tax deductible as charitable contributions for federal income tax purposes although a portion of the dues may be tax deductible under other provisions of the Internal Revenue Code.

Check: I hereby agree to pay to the Association the dues and assessments described above and as may be prescribed by the Association and certified to the School Board for each year thereafter. <u>Check must be attached to application</u>. It is your responsibility to call each year for possible change in dues amount. Cash payments must be paid the first working day of the new school year.

Important note: You must check your paycheck each year to be sure dues are being deducted from each paycheck. A break in service or other situations may cause your deductions to be suspended or stopped. Be proactive and check each paycheck.

THE STATE OF PUBLIC EDUCATION WHILE RON DESANTIS HAS BEEN GOVERNOR

In response to legislative attacks on

education, teachers are fleeing Florida.



DeSantis has kept Rick Scott's legacy* alive with his support of legislation that prevents experienced teachers from earning the pay the deserve.

On average, Florida teacher pay ranks 48th in the nation.

This year there are more than 9,000 projected teacher

vacancies, and fewer than 3,000 students completed a teacher education program. These numbers do not include the more than 5,000 support staff vacancies.


THE STATE OF PUBLIC EDUCATION WHEN CHARLIE CRIST WAS GOVERNOR



Crist listened to educators and vetoed SB 6 - the original bill designed to cheat experienced teachers out of fair pay and create instability in schools by eliminating job security for highly effective teachers.



On average, Florida teacher pay ranked 36th in the nation.





Crist respects teachers' professionalism and rejected attempts to evaluate teachers on student test scores.



People were clamoring to be educators in Florida. Almost 8,500 students completed a teacher education program. There was not a teacher shortage.



Florida ranks 44th in per-student expenditures.
Many experienced educators are forced to live with
friends or family because of laws DeSantis supported that
have kept them from receiving the raises they deserve
and denied them access to affordable housing.

Florida ranked 40th in per-student expenditures.

Crist believes every educator should be able to afford to live in the community where they work and is committed to investing in higher salaries for all educators while also tackling the housing crisis.

*In 2011, Rick Scott signed SB 736. The bill was virtually identical to SB 6 that Charlie Crist vetoed and began the decade-long legacy of the experienced teacher pay penalty in Florida that resulted in Florida falling to the bottom in the nation in terms of average teacher salary.
